
REVENGE. ALL IT

LOGLINE

Left for dead after bungling a petty scam on a sadistic gambler, a lowly racetrack stooper fights back with the help of the gambler's ex-girlfriend to regain his dignity and recover a valuable lottery ticket that rightfully belongs to him.

Length: Feature film (90-110 minutes)

Genre: Crime / Revenge: Driven man turns the tables on his tormentor

WHAT'S THE APPEAL?

Plot elements that audiences appreciate

- An underdog vanquishes his tormentor and wins the girl
- A scam goes well, until it turns horribly wrong thanks to a turncoat
- An assassin thinks he killed his quarry, giving the surviving victim options

Easy to shoot: all interior scenes can be done on a lot

Expense benefits from small cast, limited locations, contemporary setting, no special FX.

Opportunity for actors to take a role against type: good guy plays a sadistic thug, e.g.



Larry begins supplementing his meager income as a dishwasher in a diner by stooping for discarded horserace tickets. Hardly glamorous, Larry's life could be OK if not for the torment meted out by thuggish gambler Vic.

Vic begins a relationship with Maddie; he pays her rent so she can quit her hospital job. Eventually, Maddie recognizes Vic's sadism. A strident argument turns violent. Fearing for her life, Maddie leaves the city and takes a job at another hospital.

Larry finds a discarded race ticket worth \$700. Instead of paying some bills, Larry spends it all on lottery tickets. After losing his diner job thanks to Vic, Larry discovers one of his lottery tickets is worth seven grand. Before Larry leaves town, he tricks Vic into buying a fake ticket that looks like the real one. Angry at being conned, Vic tortures the real ticket out of Larry. As a "trade," Vic stuffs the bogus ticket in Larry's shirt pocket. Vic's goon Ray shoots Larry in the back of the head, killing him — or so he thinks.

In a hospital, Larry meets Maddie, and the two develop a relationship. Unknown to Larry, the bogus ticket in his pocket bears the numbers of a multi-million dollar jackpot. Concluding Larry is still alive possessing the valuable ticket, he sends in Ray who takes the ticket — and Maddie — to Vic. Before Vic can drive off with both, Larry rushes his car, incapacitates Ray and takes the wheel. A fight and a car crash ensue. Larry and Maddie walk away from the crash scene. Leaving unconscious Vic in a compromising situation. Larry and Maddie cash out to a life of luxury while crippled Vic rots in jail.

Middle-aged urban man down on his luck, scrapes by washng dishes in a diner.

Young artist/painter new to the city living on her own. Cleans facilities in a hospital.

Middle-aged, powerful man who derives quasi-criminal income from gambling, loan-sharking.

Meek, but harbors fantasy of revenge for Vic's torment.

Thoughtful and caring, inexperienced with society's dark underbelly.

Employs an entourage of ruffians who enforce his rules.


Clever and industrious when the situations calls.


Easily impressed by wealth and power, but quickly learns the negative sides.


Treats weak people poorly, especially Larry whom he encounters frequently.
