
Time Flies when You're Fusking with it

WHAT'S THE APPEAL?

The story aligns with the "time travel gone wrong" genre represented by several successful movies. The structure is that of popular Twilight Zone episodes where a bizarre twist occurs on the last page.

Although bad things happen to the characters, the tone is dark comedy which appeals to adult audiences who enjoy watching the travails and triumphs of an anti-hero.

Script could be scrubbed down to the length of a typical Twilight Zone TV episode.

Expense benefits from small cast, limited locations, contemporary setting, minimal special FX.



Scientists and business associates Morty and Chris have toiled for years to develop a device that could make them rich beyond imagination. But with every passing year of no success, Chris becomes increasingly disgruntled, especially after Morty gets engaged to Arielle, the company's business manager, an investor, and Chris's one-time lover.

Chris finally makes a breakthrough: he transports an object through the device into the past. To celebrate, Chris arranges a barbecue where he drunkenly blabs about the secret project in front of his guests, including his son Albert.

Morty directs Chris to brief the investors in the Middle East. Albert tells his friend Declan about the time-transporting device. Far away, Chris becomes suspicious when he cannot contact Morty. Chris doesn't know that Morty interrupted Declan's attempt to steal the device from the lab, and that Declan killed him, disposing Morty's corpse before absconding with the device and a laptop containing the critical operating code.

Upon his return, Chris discovers both Morty and the device missing, and assumes the worst. Arielle agrees, and joins her former lover to smoke out the missing businessman. Chris visits the lab to search for clues, but after his security code is rejected he breaks in initiating an alarm alerting the police. The cops bust in on the scene of a heinous crime: Morty's bloody corpse has just appeared from that point in the past when Declan forced it through the device.

Chris is convicted. Years later a scientist who came into possession of the laptop visits Chris in prison, informing him that he was able to recreate the device. Chris instructs the scientist to send a letter to the Chris of the past imploring him to turn down Morty's offer to join his business venture to build the device in the first place.

Main Characters MORTY

CHRIS

Chief technologist working for Morty, and frustrated family man in his 40s.

Former lover of Arielle for whom he still harbors desire.

Brilliant, hard-working, impetuous. Jealous of Morty's wealth.

Suffers from a persecution complex. The anti-hero type. Founder, CEO and primary investor in the lab.

Recent widower in his 40s married to Arielle, who unbeknownst to him was once Chris's lover.

Patient wheeler-dealer devoted to the success of the lab; willing to wait for financial fortune he's confident is always around the corner.

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
Charming, stylish, educated office manager in her 30s.

Trusting, but also realistic.


Treats Chris coldly to mask her true feelings for him.


